## **COMMUNITY PROJECTS**

November 18th. the **AFSC** On coordinated with fire crews from the Pine Grove Conservation Camp to begin their hand treatment on the vital Pine Acres Fuelbreak. This predominantly a maintenance project to keep this important fuel break viable for many years to come. This fuelbreak mitigating was critical in devastation from both the Butte Fire of 2015 and the Electra Fire of 2022.

The Pine Grove crews will be lopping, chipping, and piling the debris from their work on some very steep slopes. With most projects, the AFSC is unable to clean off vegetation on slopes over 50 or so percent, however, this project demands handwork to maintain the clearances needed to stop wildfires coming out of the Mokelumne Canyon.





AFSC is expecting the implementation of contracted work by Nate's Tree Service on slopes between 30%-60% in the beginning of December. In total, the Pine Grove crews are expected to hand clear approximately 50 acres of these steep slopes and Nate's Tree Service is expected to clear approximately 60 acres with machine masticators. This grant will conclude in March of 2025.



# ALL THINGS AMADOR COUNTY FIREWISE!



2024 saw a tremendous amount of work accomplished by the Firewise Communities of Amador County. Every year, each Firewise community must make a minimum volunteer contribution of 1 hour of wildfire risk reduction effort to remain in good standing as a certified and nationally recognized Firewise USA community. This includes activities such as:

- working with local forestry and fire related experts
- coordinating projects/meetings regarding wildfire outreach events and educational presentations
- training events for residents
- improvements and maintenance on homes and outbuildings
- improvements and maintenance within the home ignition zones
- neighborhood/community focused projects
- actual expenses

This year, the communities in good standing within Amador County not only met those requirements, but exceeded them by an enormous amount, and are truly 'sparking the effort'.

The National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) calculates the risk reduction efforts from each Firewise community as such: 1 hour worked = \$31.80 contributed to risk reduction. Each Firewise community can include the following when adding up their work totals for the year:

- Chipper costs
- Rental equipment costs
- Hired contractor costs
- Home Improvement costs
- Landscaping costs
- Vehicle mileage
- Miscellaneous activities (burn piles, raking, home hardening, etc.)

## **Amador County Firewise USA Year End Totals**

Risk Reduction Expense Investment Costs: \$1,627,040.70

Risk Reduction Work Hours Recorded: 34,655

Total Risk Reduction Investment: \$2,760,021.73

Throughout 2024, Amador County's Firewise communities participated in numerous programs offered by the AFSC and the Amador Resource Conservation District (ARCD). Examples of these programs are:

- Ingress/Egress Vegetation Removal
- Community Fuel Breaks
- Neighborhood Chipping Events
- Neighborhood Street Signage Update/Replacement

In 2021, Neighborhood Leads and members from the Upper Rancheria and Quartz Mountain Firewise communities submitted a proposal to the AFSC to implement a fuel break in their region. The AFSC then applied for and obtained grant funding through Cal Fire's Fire Prevention grant program. The fuel break

As of this Fall, Krisman Enterprises and Bordges Timber **completed 199.17 acres** out of the project total of 246 acres.
